DAILY DRAWING REMINDER

Notice: Your 2014 dues must be paid by January 1 in order to be eligible for the daily drawing. For those not familiar with the daily drawing, it works like this:

There is a grey box with a 25-cent coin slot in it, on a table at the end of the bar. Look for the "Mail Call" board on the wall, the box sets under it. Every time you come into the post, IF YOU HAVE A CURRENT YEAR (2014) MEMBERSHIP CARD, put a quarter (quarters only please) in the slot, pull the handle and sign your name in the blank square then provided. When you do this you are entering for a chance to win the pot amount that is posted on the white board over this table. The next morning, by a computerized random number drawing selection, a member is selected from ALL THE CURRENTLY PAID MEMBERS. If your number is drawn, and you were in the previous day and signed up for the daily drawing, you win the amount that was posted on the board. That's how it works.

Please put the last four digits of your membership number behind your name (as was originally done). This eliminates confusion or debate when names are the same, similar, or not totally legible when signed.

I would like to start out by giving our Color Guard another shout out for the Forgotten Hero's Ceremony that was held at LCW Post 1 on the morning of Veterans Day. Kudos go to Glen Stenson and Retired General Sal Villano for running the ceremony and presenting the medals to the families. A luncheon followed with the 40/8 fish fry. In the afternoon, the Color Guard presented the colors at Holly Hills Elementary School for their "Salute to Veterans Day" at a school assembly attended by the entire school. The school presented LCW Post 1 with a paper mache flag that the students made for the assembly. I would also like to thank all the volunteers that helped with the Pearl Harbor ceremony as well as Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners for people that don't have anywhere to go. This is greatly appreciated.



Sr. Vice Commander Charles Sharrock resigned due to health issues concerning his wife, and Trudi Plimpton resigned as Sergeant-at-Arms due to a conflict with her school schedule. I would like to fill both of these positions as quickly as possible. I have filled the open Jr. Vice Commander position with Paul Gremse. Remember, we all need to step up for the good of LCW Post 1 to keep it the #1 Legion Post in the state.

There are a couple things I would like to talk about concerning the direction of the Post. I think it would be very beneficial to have a yearly Post fundraiser with all the organizations participating. This would provide a reserve for any emergency or special projects that the Post wants to do. We are in the middle of fundraising for a new roof that has generated approximately \$ 1,650. The Post had a very effective fundraising campaign and pretty much paid for the entire cost for our building's new carpet that was just installed. Without a yearly fundraiser, everybody turns to the Memorial Board to make things good whenever something needs to be done. The Memorial Board is still waiting for the repayment of an operating loan of \$ 5,000 that paid the Post's expenses when an emergency need for help arose. This is not the responsibility of the Memorial Board. I think that if all the organizations could come together and create an annual fundraiser for the benefit of the Post, our financial health would improve immensely.

I think I'll save my thoughts about my second inspiration for another time. I lost my train of thought so I think that's what you can call a brain fart.

The Post could use volunteers for our various Americanism programs. It could be American Legion Baseball, Boys or Girls State, National Oratorical Contest, or Junior Shooting Sports. All of these programs do not take an inordinate amount of your time and the gratification you get more than exceeds any inconvenience. Glen Stenson informed me that only five applications were received for the entire state of Colorado for the National Oratorical contest. I have been the Baseball director for Post 1 for many years now and I would love if somebody could step up or help out.

Flag Code

It is not mentioned in the U.S. Flag code, but by tradition, if you fly a Flag on a flag pole that is too short for the Flag to be lowered to half-staff (such as a home Flag mounted diagonally off the porch or window) then it is respectful to signify honor and mourning by flying a black streamer from the top of the flag pole/staff. It should not be attached to the Flag, but to the pole.

History Of The Box Car

In 1947, American newspaper columnist Drew Pearson was so moved by the conditions in war torn Europe that he called upon Americans for donations for food, clothing, medical and other supplies to aid the plights of France and Italy. He proposed a plan for a train to cross America collecting car loads of donated supplies as it went.

The "Friendship Train," as it was called, left Los Angeles on November 7, 1947, with eight empty boxcars. The response from across America was overwhelming and 11 days later on November 18, 1947, the "Friendship Train" arrived in New York with some 700 Box Cars loaded with donated goods worth \$40 million. The supplies were then shipped to the region.

As the aid began to pour in, a French Veteran of WW1 and railroad worker named André Picard was so grateful for America's outpouring of generosity that he formulated a response and joined with the French Veterans Association to reply with a 49 car "Merci Train" of WW1 era boxcars, each filled with mementoes from the French people and sent to America.

The boxcars arrived in New York Harbor February 3, 1949, and as the "Gratitude Train," as it came to be called in America, crossed the Nation, one boxcar with its contents was donated to each of the 48 States with one shared equally by the District of Columbia and the Territory of Hawaii.

Today these "Boxcars" stand in their respective States as a testament to these two incredible displays of goodwill and have evolved through the efforts of "La Societe de 40 and 8" and the National Boxcar Association to annually raise funding to support the many charitable programs of the 40/8 in support of our communities across this great nation.

The National Boxcar Association was founded in 1965 as an affiliate of "La Societe de Forty & Eight" with the primary purpose of preserving the Box Car as the symbol of the Forty & Eight. Over time Locomotives were added to the symbolic rolling stock of the NBCA since they were connected and needed to haul the Box Cars. The rest is history. The contributions of the Box Car Association bridge the scope of Forty & Eight programs and membership in the National Box Car Association is a tradition among all Voyageurs Militaire.
