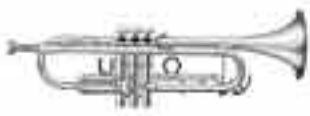

## Legionnaire

William Allen "Billy" Thompson, a member of Post 1, served in the Army National Guard from 1969-1975. Billy is a native of Greenville, South Carolina, and played college football at Maryland State College. After playing his last college game, the All Star Game for College Graduates, he became a second round draft pick by the Broncos coach Lou Saban in 1969.

While practicing his first season, two Military Police personnel showed up on the practice field and were ready to take Billy into custody for not registering for the draft. Coach Saban stepped in and negotiated a deal that would allow Billy to complete his first season with the understanding that after the season he would report to the Army for induction.

In late November 1969, Billy reported to Fort Ord for basic training, tired and battered and bruised from a grueling season as a rookie. But did the Army care? No, he was nothing but a lowly recruit in basic training. Billy excelled at Fort Ord and was selected as the Basic Training Outstanding Training Leader for the

4th Platoon and thereby the Platoon Leader. One of his most cherished experiences was this selection and all of his accomplishments on the field of baseball and football were thus secondary to the recognition he received from his fellow recruits. He speaks proudly of this accomplishment and the pride instilled in him through the Army basic training program.

In his rookie season, 1969, he led the league in punts and kickoff returns and was the starting cornerback for the Denver Broncos. Thompson was a three-time Pro Bowl selection and was inducted into the Broncos Ring of Fame in 1987. Thompson played his entire 13-year career for the Denver Broncos from 1969-1981. During his career he was selected to the three Pro Bowls in 1977, 1978, and 1981 and was an All-Pro selection in 1977. He is currently third on the Broncos all-time list for games started with 179, and holds the club record for interception return yards at 784.

Billy is currently the Director of Community Outreach for the Denver Broncos.

When interviewing him, he was silent about his accomplishments on the football field. Like so many other veterans, all of his sports accomplishments are secondary to his accomplishments in the Army National Guard and having the opportunity to serve his country and represent the U.S. Army.

## Bicycles For The Second Chance Bicycle Shop

Post 1 is still collecting bikes for the Second Chance Bicycle Shop. The American Legion Post 1 supports the shop and is planning a bike collection day sometime in the near future. We hope to establish a date sometime in late July.

During a recent neighborhood cleanup day, plus a neighborhood garage sale, members of this Post collected bikes for Second Chance. A message was posted on the Next-door neighborhood website asking for bikes, and through this posting, 19 bikes were collected for the shop.

The bikes will be repaired by young people performing community service, and given to veterans and their families, and others needing a bike, based on their ability to pay. Each young man or woman working to complete their community service will receive a bike at the completion of their service.

## Memories Flourish At The Wall

Clotilde Szelkowski remembers John Souther as an “all-around wonderful person” who could be a fun-loving prankster with a serious side.

Souther’s memory is what motivated Szelkowski to make the trip from Colorado to Washington, D.C., for Memorial Day commemorations at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial.

“The ultimate sacrifice my brothers and sisters paid is what brings me out today,” said Szelkowski, a member of Post 1 in Denver. “I don’t remember when (Souther) was killed. I don’t want to remember. I just know he’s on the Wall, and he is probably the No. 1 reason. But the others are the No. 1.1 reason. None of them are any more important than the others.”

Szelkowski, who served as a Navy corpsman, visited Souther’s name on the Wall. “I try to remember when we were kids because that’s

when I knew him. Otherwise I totally break down.”
