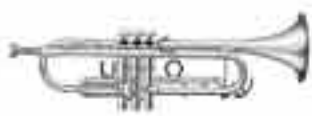

American Legion Oratorical Contest And Boys/Girls State Program

Letters have been sent to approximately 85 high schools in the local area asking for teachers and students to participate in the American Legion Oratorical Contest. Included with the letter was a copy of the American Legion pamphlet describing the oratorical contest, the selected assigned topics on the amendments to the constitution, and the application form.

For the 2018 contest, the assigned topics are three amendments and one article to the constitution and are listed as follows:

Amendment 2 — Right to Keep and Bear Arms.

Amendment 3 — Places restrictions on the quartering of soldiers in private homes without the owner's consent, prohibiting it during peacetime.

Amendment 15 — Prohibits the denial of the right to vote based on race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Article 2, Section 4 — Disqualification. The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors.

Letters were also sent to the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps

Commanders (JROTC) with the hope that the commanders will encourage their young cadets to participate in the oratorical contest. In the following weeks, letters will be sent to the JROTC regarding Boys/Girls State and asking for participation from the student cadets.

Anyone knowing of a student in high school that wants to nominate the student for participation in the contest or the Boys State program can do so by giving them a pamphlet and letting me know if they send in an application for either of the programs.

The Boys State Program will be held at CSU/Pueblo on June 4-10, 2018, and the Girls State Program will be at UNC Greeley on June 11-17, 2018. The Colorado State Oratorical Contest will be held at Metropolitan State University Denver on Saturday, March 10, 2018.

The Americanism Committee is looking for volunteers this year to serve as judges, guides, and mentors for the students and work closely with the school administrators and parents on these projects. We are trying to set up a date for training of judges and scoring of the contestant's speech. If you are interested in being a volunteer, please let me know and we'll work together to make sure you have the training, materials, and information necessary.

Who Is Going To Fill Our Shoes?

One of my favorite songs is "Who's Gonna Fill Their Shoes?" by George Jones. In the 1985 hit, he asks about the void left by Elvis Presley, Hank Williams, Marty Robbins, and others who are gone.

It's a question I often ask about legendary figures of The American Legion. Who is going to fill their shoes?

Who is going to advocate for veterans, as the doughboys home from World War I did when they formed an organization to leave no U.S. service members behind and ensured that their widows and orphans would receive compassion and support from a grateful nation?

Who is going to instill the values of citizenship to young people through programs like American Legion Baseball, Boys State and Boys Nation, Oratorical, Shooting Sports, Scouting and all the others?

Who is going to educate the public about the U.S. flag and champion a constitutional amendment to protect it from desecration?

For 98 years, The American Legion has been filling these shoes. Unsung heroes, people whose names you don't know and probably never will know, have changed lives in every corner of the country. They have made world-changing achievements, like the GI Bill, and they have provided financial help for individual families in need.

Who is going to fill the shoes of American Legion volunteers who

contributed more than 645,000 hours at VA facilities last year and saved the government more than \$14 million?

Who is going to conduct the blood drives, food drives, and fundraisers to help others in communities all across the map? Who is going to hold VA accountable?

It has to be you. It has to be me. And it has to be American Legion Family members who have yet to join. We need to invite others now to help launch a second century of service, advocacy and camaraderie.

Eligible new members can be found. You probably know some. Look at all of the National Guard and reserve units, for instance, that have been activated since August 2, 1990. Look at the fact that the current membership window has been open for 27 years — by far the longest span in the history of the American Legion.

More than 18 million veterans are eligible to join. If only 15 percent become Legion members, we are back to 2.7 million. It can be done.

If you love our American Legion Family as much as I do, please continue to renew, recruit and, where it makes sense, revitalize a Post.

As my year as national commander ends, I urge you to welcome new faces, listen to fresh ideas, and encourage today's veterans to start filling our shoes. The future depends on us.
