D-Day Remembrance Program At LCW Post 1

Squadron 1 member Neil Wolkodolf had a great idea — a D-Day remembrance to honor WWII Veterans on the 74th anniversary of the Normandy invasion. It began with a rededication of the newly refurbished (thanks to Denver Parks and Recreation and members of Post 1) kilometer marker at Veterans Park, which France had presented to the City of Denver many years ago.

That was followed by the French-themed luncheon at Post 1 attended

by WWII veterans from several different facilities as well as those who are members of the Post, the French Consul Jeff Richards and radio legend Steffan Tubbs as emcee. The Post 1 Color Guard, Boy Scouts from Troop 79 and many wonderful Post 1 volunteers recognized our heroes from the Greatest Generation. It was a tremendous success. Channels 4 and 9 were here with camera crews, as well as a representative from *The Denver Post*. Nine attendees' photos made the front page of the newspaper the next day

WWII Medal of Honor recipient, Elmer E. Fryar, receives burial plaque 74 years after his death

Red, white and blue ruffled through the air as what would have been the country's first... A small group, most in military and a few in civilian clothes, gathered in Block 96 of the sprawling Olinger Crown Hill Mortuary and Cemetery in Westcliffe. A stone marker with a faded flag on top sat waiting to be placed in the ground. The stone's light-colored granite contrasted with its gold lettering: "In memory of Elmer E. Fryar."

The man died in 1944 while fighting in the Leyte Peninsula in the Philippines during World War II. He was posthumously awarded a Congressional Medal of Honor. But Fryar, who was from Denver, was never named an official marker from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. He had no living relatives to do so. On Sunday, the day before Memorial Day and 74 years after his death, the group gathered to place a marker that had been commissioned by the Medal of Honor Foundation.

Thoughts From The Incoming Unit President For 2018-2019

On June 12, 2018, a joint family installation of newly elected officers for The American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, and the Sons of The American Legion was held. Speaking for the American Legion Auxiliary Unit One members, this newly installed president predicts that it was the beginning of a great year.

We are indeed the Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Legion family in that we help and support each other's endeavors. One way to support each other would be to attend the money raising projects functions the four groups put on. These money raising projects include hamburger nights, spaghetti nights, breakfasts, or other projects. The four groups include, The American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, Sons of The American Legion, and the 40/8.

This a quote from the auxiliary's hamburger night menu:

"Thank you for your continued support of our auxiliary money raising projects. Our money (including your generous tip money) goes to support our veterans and their families. We appreciate your support very much!"

Throughout this past year the unit has contributed money in support of veterans and their families. Some examples would include donating for canteen books for hospitalized

veterans in the VA hospital at Christmas, the Auxiliary Emergency Fund that assists Auxiliary members who need temporary financial assistance, both the 244th and the 140th groups of reservists and active duty military and sponsoring five delegates to the 2018 Colorado Girls State.

In addition to the donations identified in the preceding paragraph, we voted to donate the following moneys totaling \$4,000: \$500 for Canteen books to be given to veterans who come to the VA hospital for treatment and do not have money for lunch or to veterans who come to the VA hospital and ask for lunch; \$500 to the All Veterans Honor Guard to defray their expenses of providing their own ammunition to provide the last honors to veterans at Fort Logan Cemetery; \$500 to buy bus tickets to transport veterans for treatment at facilities outside Colorado; \$500 to provide rehabilitation at the VA hospital 5th and 7th floor; \$500 to the Fisher House to assist them in providing housing for the families of veterans while the veterans are receiving care; \$500 to the van project for the Colorado State Veterans Community Living Center; \$250 to the department president's project.

Again, thank you to the LCW Legion family for the generous physical, emotional, and financial support you have provided to the LCW Unit One programs and projects.
