Glen Stenson

The Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Post 1 is very fortunate to have Glen Stenson as a member of our organization and acknowledges the work he does for the American Legion, VFW, and "For God and Country."

Glen was born in Holyoke, Colorado, on December 14, 1925, and was the oldest of six siblings in his family. After graduating from Holyoke High School in 1943, he joined the US Navy in March of the same year. Basic training for Glen was in Farragut, Idaho, at the Naval Training Base where he became a Navy corpsman.

After Hospital Corps School, Glen was stationed at the US Naval Hospital in Seattle, from September '43 to November '43, and from there he went to Gonzaga University Medical Dispensary from Dec. '43 to Dec. '44. After the training, he was assigned to the USS Tranquility Hospital Ship, and was Head Corpsman in the Special Diet Kitchen. Treating the wounded through proper diet procedures was a challenge for Glen because of the severity of the wounded on the hospital ship

and the dietary limitations placed on the wounded men by the medical

Glen was discharged in April 1946, shortly after the war, at the rank of Pharmacy Mate 2C, and was awarded the Asiatic Theatre Campaign, World War II, and American Campaign ribbons. The USS Tran-

quility served in the Pacific Theatre and the ship was on duty during the invasion of Okinawa. The ship was part of the rescue operation for the crew of the USS Indianapolis. His most poignant experience was sailing near the coast of Japan and knowing the ship he was on, the USS Tranquility, was to be the lead

medical ship during the planned invasion of Japan.

During breaks from his duties as a Corpsman, he and some of his shipmates cobbled together a 16 piece dance band that played at night after duty hours. Glen recognized that beauty and peacefulness of the music during a very difficult time when he was caring for severely wounded sailors and marines.

Glen's been a member of the American Legion since his discharge from active duty and Post 1 since 1988. He's served as Post Commander, Oratorical Chairman, Baseball Chairman (which he restarted in 1990 as the Post was not involved in boys baseball), Boys State, House Committee, Post Chaplain, and in many other positions.

In addition, Glen has served the 40/8 Voiture No. 97 as Grande Chef de Gare, Chef de Gare, Grand Chef de Trane, and Commissaire Intendant for four years, plus other posi-

The following quote is from our dear friend and Legionnaire Glen Stenson:

"I firmly believe that all members should take part in our Legion programs and activities. We should remember that it was the American Legion, in cooperation with the National Education Association, and the two organizations started National Education Week. Each school should have a Legion member representative. The young people love to have a veteran around and are quite inquisitive."

244th Christmas Party

Before I report on the Christmas Party for the soldiers and families in the 244th Engineer Battalion U.S. Army Reserves, I want to share some history for newer members of the Post 1 family. The troops had just gotten home from Iraq, the Auxiliary wanted to honor them at a Hamburger Night. Most were cleaning and storing their equipment but two men were able to come and one asked "if you can adopt us?" The Auxiliary adopted the HHC. Reservists cannot legally ask for help and do not have the

support that those soldiers at an Army Base receive.

Our Auxiliary President at the time, Cyndi Clavier, as well as some Auxiliary members became members of the Family Readiness Group of the 244th. Ron Bishop was Commander and felt that the Legion could not "let the ladies get ahead of the Post" and the Post adopted them too. Over the years we have worked to produce two mandatory parties per year, established a Food Bank, and helped soldiers in a pinch.

This year's Christmas Party was the largest ever! Over 400 people were fed.

There is a core FRG group of three women; four others helped with this party. Ten soldiers were assigned or volunteered to help unload the cars loaded with food, craft and game supplies, gifts, and the essentials for throwing a party. They also set up the buffet tables and unpacked many bags of gifts.

Our Post 1 American Legion Family could not have given this party without the help of other groups and individuals! Texas Roadhouse gave a great deal on the food; Cherry Hills Community Church gave us wrapped gifts for girls; an individual, who wishes to remain anonymous, donated \$800; and a Mom and Daughter (also anonymous) donated bags of toys.

"Sunshine Boyz" (a non partisan group in Littleton

that keeps an eye on City Hall) donated food for the food bank, men's clothing, gift cards and cash; "Girls Running" gave 400 cans of food for the food bank; 38th District Democrats gave a car packed with food for the food bank. Buckley Leadership Development Center waived the \$200 rental

fee, and the man who would have been given the money, stayed and helped.

Working together we were able to serve those who have been serving us. Not an elegant party but a generous and fun party! Every child got gifts.

The Food Bank has been a Blessing to the troops, they cannot say enough how grateful they are for the help. Sunshine Boyz has had three food drives and a school supplies drive for the 244th this year! We have a "shopping time" at drill and easily help 100 soldiers each time. The reason they need help is some lost jobs while



deployed, and rents are skyrocketing. Every soldier needing groceries got them. We were "cleaned out" at the Saturday December drill and again on Sunday at the Party. The families were most appreciative of all the help.


