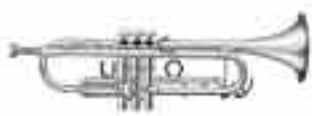

Memorial Day is a Federal Holiday for remembering the men and women who died while serving in this country's armed forces. It is a time when many people visit cemeteries to honor those who have died in military service. There are parades throughout the United States and a ceremony for placing a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers in Arlington Cemetery. I am proud to say that our Color Guard participated in the parades in Denver and Grand Lake.

the freedoms we take for granted.

We need to apologize to Crown Hill Cemetery for our lack of patriotism to our fallen veterans this year. I hope this mistake wakes up members of Legion Post #1, that in order to have a productive Post, it doesn't have to be a few that volunteer, but the many that need to step up and help.

The donation process is simple and easy.

Make a phone call to Vehicles For Charity (1-888-628-2277) or go to the website www.vehiclesforcharity.org and complete an online donation form. The donation will be credited to the Post 1 account. All the donor needs to do is remove the license plates from the vehicle and sign the title prior to pick-up. The vehicle pick-up is scheduled with a tow company (at no cost to the donor), and it is either taken to an auction for sale or to an auto crusher for recycling purposes.

A donation acknowledgement as well as a thank you is mailed within 30 days following the sale of the vehicle. There is absolutely no cost to either the donor or the non-profit recipient. All proceeds after the sale are sent to LCW Post 1. VFC accepts automobiles, trucks, vans, recreational vehicles, motorcycles, dirt bikes, tractors, boats and trailers.
