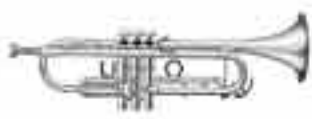

Last, but not least. The Post has several capital intensive projects scheduled soon. We are fortunate to have a very ambitious and responsible Memorial Board. The Post will be conducting a substantial upgrade to the kitchen ventilation and cooking equipment. Significant changes to the front room (auditorium), consisting of AV and redecorating are in the planning stages, as well as new seating for the bar. I mention all of this because, IT ALL COSTS MONEY! If you can make a financial contribution to the Post Memorial Board it would be greatly appreciated.

LCW Memorial Board Report • April 15, 2014

Your Memorial Board (MB) met April 5, 2014. The agenda focused on how to resolve a number of pressing building issues. As you know, the MB holds title to the Post facility and also the majority of our cash reserves (approx. \$230,000). Therefore, the MB is responsible for leading the effort to maintain and update our facility. Our Post was remodeled in 1993. Twenty years have passed. I think we have done a very good job of maintaining the property; however, the time has come to deal with the roof, kitchen, a heating/cooling unit, audio/visual equipment and security requirements. Our roof is our first priority.

We received five bids to replace or repair the roof. The bids for a TPO membrane roof were between \$32,000 through \$50,000. Two of the contractors also bid a roll-on product called GACO. The low GACO material bid was \$11,000 with a 50-year guaranty on materials, and a 5-year guaranty on labor. The MB decided to go with \$11,000 bid.

We also need to replace worn out equipment. First, we recently replaced a refrigerator at a cost of \$2,700. Our stove and grill need to

be replaced. A new stove (\$8,500) and a new grill (\$1,000) are budgeted. We are trying to find slightly used equipment; however, that possibility remains uncertain. Our kitchen hood fan has been a serious problem. We intend to fix that problem with a new hood fan (\$3,200). This last very cold spell, we did not have heat in the kitchen that resulted in some frozen pipes. Our new caterer was very patient. Solution, replace the 20 year old rooftop heating/cooling unit (\$16,800). The new rooftop unit must be in sync with the exhaust fan. The new installation will correct that problem. If you visit the Post, you know we pride ourselves by providing new technology. We do need some upgrades.

We need to replace some defective cameras and need a new DVR (\$1,500). We also need to generate additional income. Our facility is under utilized during the day. In order to rent our auditorium, we need to install audiovisual equipment (\$3,500) and main screen (\$1,800). Our location and access should be favorable to businesses that conduct training and/or all day meetings. Successful implementation and marketing could raise \$1,500 to \$2,500 per month. I do not like spending that dips into our reserves

beyond our \$200,000 goal; however, I believe the items identified are justified.

There were 18 Memorial Board Members present and almost all expenditures requested received a unanimous vote. It is also our goal to provide a facility in which we all can be proud. Our membership should also know, with the exception of new carpet and a request for help on the roof this past year, neither the Post or Memorial Board have made any request for funds during the last decade. The total expenditure is estimated at \$50,000. I hope you all agree that this effort is money well spent.

Commander's Corner

Ok boys and girls. Since Memorial Day is right around the corner, I think that my last Commander's Corner will be a history lesson concerning LCW Post 1. The letters LCW stand for Leo Leyden, Marcellus Chiles, and J. Hunter Wickersham. All three received the Medal of Honor posthumously for their conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty in action with the enemy during World War 1. Hunter Wickersham died near Limey France in the St. Mihiel offensive on September 12, 1918. On this day in 1918, the American Expeditionary Force under the command of John J. Pershing launched the first major offensive operation as an independent army during World War 1. The day before he died, He wrote a poem that was enclosed in his last letter to his mother, Mrs. Mary E. Damon of Denver.
