

ACRONYM Film Showing At LCW Post 1

On Saturday, May 28, the Com-

bat Veterans Cowboy Up, Thera-

peutic Equine-Assisted Learning

program, gave Legion members in

attendance an emotional and thought

provoking view of the film "ACRO-

NYM." About 75 members and oth-

ers attended the showing. According

to Mountain Time Media, the infor-

mation below summarizes the film's

impact on veterans suffering from

post traumatic stress disorder

(PTSD), traumatic brain injury

(TBI), and military sexual trauma

(MST), plus other "injuries" from

which current and past veterans may

be suffering.

"ACRONYM: The Cross-Gen-

erational Battle With PTSD is the

latest documentary film that pre-

miered November 11, Veterans Day.

From the beginning of war, those

thrust onto the field of battle have

gone through their own levels of

mental trauma. **ACRONYM**, a new

94-minute documentary, takes an

in-depth and personal look at those

who are experiencing, suffering

from and living with Post-Traumatic

sacrifice of our veterans and their
families, **ACRONYM** looks ahead
with hope.

ACRONYM is a gripping, vivid

and real account of the invisible

trauma war leaves behind. Regard-

less of their combat tours in differ-

ent wars, many U.S. veterans living

with PTSD share the same common

enemy. **ACRONYM** takes a differ-

ent approach to examining this im-

portant topic, with veterans sharing

their most personal stories of both

horror and triumph. The documen-

tary does not place blame, nor does

it suggest a singular approach to

"solving" the issue. PTSD is a very

personal and individual problem."

From a personal standpoint, here's

what I believe most of us took away

from the time spent that day. All

veterans have heavy hearts when

they think of other veterans, espe-

cially of those they served with who

gave their lives, of those who were

wounded and carry the scars of bat-

tle, and those who served many

years ago and are now feeling the

effects of their experiences. PTSD

does not just happen when the vet-

There are many groups that volunteer, such as the Color Guard, SAL, Ladies Auxiliary, and the 40/8. Most of these activities are announced and known to the adjutant and Legion members, and reported to the National and State offices.

Many of you, and we are glad to say "many of you," know the number of volunteer hours you put in, for example, at the VA hospitals, within the community, and representing the Post. However, we know that you are humble, quiet, and go about your volunteerism, not wanting to call attention to the efforts you give to the community as a Legionnaire.

We are asking that you let us know about the work you do in the community as we need this information to complete the necessary year-end reports to the National and State offices to let them know how much we are doing. It's a way of letting others know of your service, such as community clean up, hospital visits, volunteer snow removal, flag placements, and a host of other patriotic activities that should be reported.

Activities such as Americanism, Community Service, Veterans volunteerism at our hospitals, Children and Youth activities, Baseball Teams,

Oratorical, job related activities or company sponsored events, etc., should be reported. Beginning with the September meeting, there will be a loose-leaf binder or a "Consolidated Post Report" form available, with categories and explanations of the categories, and we are asking that you take some time before or after the meeting to enter your activity. Alternatively, you can provide this information by emails, postal mail, phone calls, and just letting the Adjutant know what you did in support of the Legion which should be reported.

Receiving this information on a monthly basis would be greatly appreciated. This information is needed to keep our non-profit status, inform Congress of our local actions, and encourage legislative support for veterans and their organizations.
