## Forgotten Heroes

The Forgotten Heroes Campaign was founded in 1998 with the purpose of helping men and women who served in the Armed Forces receive the medals earned but never received. The Campaign has helped over 500 men and women and their families get the recognition due them. Upon verification of the veteran's service, the medals are presented to the recipient at a special ceremony.

It is not known how many veterans did not receive their medals. Many did not receive their medals due to poor recordkeeping, transportation, and rapid discharges. Changes in military operations in today's service result in transfers before the service man or woman can be honored in their unit. The Campaign is placing emphasis on World War II and Korean veterans due to their ages, and it is hoped they can be recognized before passing on. Requests from veterans of all conflicts are encouraged to notify the Campaign, if they desire to be recognized.

The Campaign is chaired by Brigadier General Sal Villano. He has filled this capacity as Chairman since its inception in 1998. Requests for information may be directed to the Campaign by mailing to the Forgotten Heroes Campaign, 5400 East Yale Avenue, Denver, Colorado 80222.

## 2016-2017 Elections

As all of you are aware, Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham (LCW) Post 1 will hold elections for Legion Officers and positions on the Executive Board. The elections will be held on Tuesday, May 10, in the Post meeting room.

All currently paid-up Legionnaires will be allowed to vote. The new officers and board members will be installed during the June regularly scheduled monthly meeting, and will serve from July 1 through June 30, 2016-2017.

Our Commander, Tony Jones, asked Dan Schamberger to serve as the Election Official. Dan will provide sign-up sheets for each open position, supervise the process of the election, provide paper ballots, check the membership roster for current paid members that are voting, and tally the results.

Please consider helping your Post with the election process. Assistant Election Officers are needed and there will be a sign-up sheet for you to state your willingness to help with the election in this capacity. The time required is only two hours and there will be four groups working during the voting time frame of 12 through 7 p.m., with one hour left for counting of the ballots and tabulation of the results, and preparation of the report to the Adjutant. Our Commander and Dan are confident that eight great members will agree to serve in this capacity for two hours during election day.

Additional election information will be posted, as required, on the sign-up sheets and on the Post bulletin board. Below is a brief summary of the positions that are open for election of new LCW Legion Officers and Executive Board members. The information was taken from our LCW Post by-laws and is provided as a brief summary of what the positions entail, thereby providing information for your thoughtful consideration to sign-up for a position.

For ease of access, the LCW Post Number 1 By-laws will be posted on the bulletin board.

**Post Executive Board:** There are three positions to be filled on the Post Executive Board. The Post Executive Board is responsible for the organization and formulation of Post policies, acting on the prepared Post operating budget as proposed by the Finance Committee, and acting on other such business as may come before the Board. The Com-

mander presides at all of the Post Executive Board meetings. Additional information regarding the Executive Board is contained in the Post by-laws.

**Post Commander:** The Post Commander will preside over all meetings of the Post and have general supervision over the business and financial affairs of the Post, including, but not limited to, preparing monthly reports, making recommendations, disbursing funds, and other duties as directed by the Post Executive Board or the General Membership of the Post.

**Senior Vice Commander:** Duties will include acting as Commander in the event the Post Commander is unable to act in his/her capacity, and other duties as assigned by the Commander or the Post Executive Board.

**Junior Vice Commander:** The First Junior Vice Commander will assume the duties of the Senior Vice Commander in the absence or disability of, or when called upon by the Post Commander, or shall have such duties as are enjoined upon him/her by the Commander or the Post Executive Board. Two positions will be filled as Junior Vice Commander(s).

In addition to the above, there may be other positions and committees with a sign-up sheet that will be available for you to put your name on if you want to express an interest in the position or committee.

Your voice and your vote counts, and through volunteering to serve, you show a strong desire to make the LCW Post a post that can be one of the most outstanding posts in the country. If we all apply the old Marine Corps slogan, "Gung Ho," which is used as an expression of spirit, and means "work together," the Post should have a very successful election this year.

# Food Drive For The 244th FRG

Twelve years ago Leyden Chiles Wickersham American Legion Auxiliary Unit 1 adopted the troops of the Headquarters Company (HHC) 244th Heavy Engineering Battalion. They are Reservists who at the time had just come back from Iraq. Some have been to Afghanistan and now a large number are back from Kuwait. Reservists do not have the support soldiers have on a Post and by law cannot ask for help. We ask them what is needed, how we can help, or we see needs and step in.

Family Readiness Groups (FRGs) are Army-directed local volunteers (in this case Unit 1 Members) team-

ing up with military family members and friends who are to be support for the families, especially of deployed soldiers. Unit 1 maintains a Food Bank for our soldiers. Some soldiers who have returned from Kuwait have lost their civilian jobs and the Food Bank Cage is nearly empty. We need help restocking this food bank and would like to have a food drive in partnership with Sunshine Boys on March 5.

Army rules are NO EXPIRED items; gift cards can be no more than \$25 in value. Only non-perishable items are collected including bath and laundry soaps, shampoo,

toothpaste, light bulbs, toilet paper, Pedialyte, First Aid supplies, school supplies. Basic needs include canned meats and tuna, peanut butter, jam or jelly, cereals, soups, canned goods of all kinds.

## Four Chaplains Ceremony



February 3 marked the historic 73rd anniversary of the sinking of the United States Army Transport Dorchester and the legendary acts of selflessness of four Army chaplains who were aboard. Four Chaplains Day, as Congress has declared the date, honors the four chaplains who went down with their ship, as they gave their life jackets to other passengers.

The Four Chaplains — sometimes called the Immortal Chaplains — were men from four different religions who sacrificed their lives for men of all faiths. In the 73 years since the incident, Methodist minister George L. Fox, Reformed Church in America minister Clark V. Poling, Roman Catholic priest John P. Washington and Rabbi Alexander B. Goode have been immortalized with commemorative postage stamps, a Congressionally recognized anniversary and numerous re-tellings of their heroics.
