

### Facts About Fort Logan National Cemetery

As Memorial Day approaches and Legionnaires turn their thoughts, prayers, and deepest feelings of gratitude and honor towards the veterans interred at Fort Logan, and other national cemeteries throughout our nation and other countries, a brief history of Fort Logan follows.

Fort Logan National Cemetery is a National Cemetery in Denver, Colorado. Fort Logan was named after Union General John A. Logan, commander of U.S. Volunteer forces during the American Civil War. It contains 214 acres and has over 122,000 interments as of 2014.

Citizens of Denver, in relative isolation and apprehension concerning increased immigration from the East and abroad, petitioned the Army to establish a post near the city. In 1886, Colorado Sen. Henry M. Teller introduced a bill in Congress authorizing construction of the post, and it was signed in February 1887. A little over three acres was set aside in 1889 for a post cemetery. The first recorded burial in the post cemetery was Mable Peterkin, daughter of Private Peterkin, who died on June 28, 1889.

The first soldiers to arrive at the fort were members of the 18th Infantry from Fort Hays and Leavenworth, Kansas. General John A. Logan, as head of the post-war veteran's organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued General Orders No. 11, establishing May 30 as "Decoration Day" to honor the Civil War dead. This later became a national holiday, which is our current Memorial Day.

Fort Logan closed in May 1946. In 1960, much of the land was deeded to the State of Colorado to establish a state hospital that still operates as the Colorado Mental Health Institute at Fort Logan. On March 10, 1950, Congress authorized the use of military lands at Fort Logan as a national cemetery, but limited the size to no more than 160 acres. Since that time, the cemetery has expanded from the original 160 acres to 214 acres.

**Medal of Honor Recipients** — Major William E. Adams, (Vietnam) U.S. Army, May 25, 1971. First Sergeant Maximo Yabes, (Vietnam) U.S. Army, February 26, 1967. Private John Davis, (Civil War) Indiana Mounted Infantry, April 1865.

**Other Notables**—Seven Buffalo Soldiers are buried at Fort Logan National Cemetery; Karl Baatz, a German POW who passed away while being held at Fort Logan, was interred in 1943.

Currently, there are approximately 93, 800 grave sites of veterans at Fort Logan.



## In Memoriam And With Remembrance

When I first joined Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Post 1, I was curious as to why World War I veterans were selected to be honored, by having their names become a part of the first American Legion Post in the Denver area. After some reading about the founding of the American Legion and the founding of Legion Post Number 1, the answer was very clear. The next three paragraphs are from our Legion history website page which gives the background on the formation of Post Number 1.

On March 20, 1919, (just three days after the adjournment of the Legion founding caucus in Paris, France) a group of Denver Veterans organized the Leo Leyden Post of World War I Veterans to honor the first Colorado hero to pay the "supreme sacrifice." This group became the first Legion Post in Colorado and the 15th to be chartered in the United States. The charter is dated June 17, 1919, and was signed by 30 members. This charter now hangs in the Post Commander's office.

J. Hunter Wickersham Post Number 51 was organized October 18, 1919, at the home of W. S. (Bill) Rathbun with 27 charter members. In 1921 and 1922 many small Legion Posts found the going tough and early in 1923 the following six Posts; Proctor, Preston, Hewitt, Steele, Rickard and Sharp abandoned their charters and joined forces with the Marcellus H. Chiles Legion Post Number 41 and became known as Columbine Post Number 41. In 1925 Post Number 41 restored the name Marcellus H. Chiles.

The Leyden, Chiles and Wickersham American Legion Posts consolidated and Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Post Number 1 was chartered on August 20, 1931, in loving memory of Private Leo T. Leyden, Captain Marcellus H. Chiles and Lieutenant J. Hunter Wickersham, all of whom gave their lives for their country.

As Memorial Day approaches, perhaps it's time to reacquire ourselves with the courageous men, whose valiant efforts during World War I, bear the name of our Post, Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Post 1, Denver, Colorado.

**Leo Thomas Leyden, Private, U.S. Marine Corps** — Private Leyden enlisted in the Marines on July 1, 1917, and he arrived in France in the spring of 1918. He was the first man from Colorado killed in WWI. The Legion Post number one was

named after him and the street Leyden was also named after Leo. Leo was a true American hero.

**Marcellus Holms Chiles, Captain, U.S. Army** — Medal of Honor citation: "When his battalion, of which he had just taken command, was halted by machine-gun fire from the front and left flank, he picked up the rifle of a dead soldier and, calling on his men to follow led the advance across a stream, waist deep, in the face of the machinegun fire. Upon reaching the opposite bank this gallant officer was seriously wounded in the abdomen by a sniper, but before permitting himself to be evacuated he made complete arrangements for turning over his command to the next senior officer, and under the inspiration of his fearless leadership his battalion reached its objective. Capt. Chiles died shortly after reaching the hospital."

**John Hunter Wickersham, 2nd Lieutenant, U.S. Army** — Medal of Honor citation: "Advancing with his platoon during the St. Mihiel offensive, he was severely wounded in four places by the bursting of a high-explosive shell. Before receiving any aid for himself he dressed the wounds of his orderly, who was wounded at the same time. He then ordered and accompanied the further advance of his platoon, although weakened by the loss of blood. His right hand and arm being disabled by wounds, he continued to fire his revolver with his left hand until, exhausted by loss of blood, he fell and died from his wounds before aid could be administered."

To these three men, we owe a huge debt of gratitude and we proudly recognize the ultimate sacrifice they give in honor of our country and we will proudly continue to honor them with the name Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Post Number 1.

- Let's all get involved just one day a month, it goes a long way. Please join me in making our Post the best American Legion Family.






