Veterans Court, American Legion And Second Chance Bicycle Shop

On Wednesday, December 5, bicycles and locks were given to five veterans participating in the Adams County Court for Veterans

(ACCV) program. The bicycles were donated by the Second Chance Bicycle Shop and funds for the locks came from our Post. The vet-

erans were happy to have a bicycle. This is truly the type of support we need to provide more of in our community outreach programs.

The ACCV program takes in veterans who have had minor scrapes with the law or minor offenses and the veteran commits to participate

in the rigorous program. The ACCV participant must follow certain guidelines, such as no drug or alcohol use, attending court when required, going to the assigned classes through the VA or another group for mental health issues when needed, and accessing other veteran resources for help. The ACCV has a full-time Veterans Justice Outreach Officer and Veterans Service Officer. The main goal of the ACCV is to help veterans get the help they need, avoid having a criminal record, and putting them on a path of recovery to give them stability in their lives.

Thanks to all our Legion family members for supporting this work and helping with the bike collection days. If you have an old bike, please bring it in and we'll get it to Ernie Clark at the Second Chance Bicycle Shop.

Any veteran who wants to participate in the Veterans Court program should contact the county or city court where they live and find out if there is a program in the District Court or Municipal Court that is specifically for veterans needing special treatment.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE V OF THE POST 1 CONSTITUTION

Article V Section 4. Removal of Post Executive Board Officers.

This section speaks to removal of Executive Board Officers for one of several reasons. One of the currently-approved reasons is: "neglect of or unfitness of duty,".

As well as the addition of Post Executive Board to the Section 4 title, the following change to Section 4 is recommended for the purpose of clarifying the meaning of "neglect":

Neglect shall include, but not be limited to, absences from Post Executive Board Meetings. Should any Post Executive Board Officer accumulate three (3) unexcused absences or a combined total of six (6) excused and unexcused absences from regularly scheduled Executive Board Meetings, within the current Post election year, the Commander or the Adjutant if the Commander be the offender, will submit a retention/dismissal recommendation to the Post Executive Board for appropriate action. The absence calculation, for all Post Executive Board Members, shall be reset to zero on the date of installation of newly-elected Post Officers and shall be in effect until the date of the next installation of newly-elected Post Officers.

Section 5. Removal of Post Executive Board Members.

This section speaks to removal of Executive Board members for one of several reasons. One of the currently-approved reasons is: "Any member of the Post Executive Board may be removed for inefficiency, which includes unexcused absences":

The following change to Section 5 is recommended for the purpose of clarifying and strengthening the meaning of "absences":

Should any Post Executive Board Member accumulate three (3) unexcused absences or a combined total of six (6) excused and unexcused absences from regularly scheduled Executive Board Meetings, within the current Post election year, the Commander or the Adjutant if the Commander be the offender, will submit a retention/dismissal recommendation to the Post Executive Board for appropriate action. The absence calculation, for all Post Executive Board Members, shall be reset to zero on the date of installation of newly-elected Post Officers and shall be in effect until the date of the next installation of newly-elected Post Officers.

He Was A Good Soldier

Forty-one years ago, August 16, 1977, Elvis Presley, "King of Rock 'n' Roll," passed away. (Where did the time go?) After having multiple gold records, and changing the sounds of music worldwide, Elvis was drafted and served in the United States Army in Germany, receiving an honorable discharge.

Elvis was born the son of poverty in Tupelo, Mississippi, but he was born with very special talents. When his parents moved to Memphis, he became influenced by much of the great music of America, from the white country singers, black rhythm and blues shouters, railroad songs, spirituals and just about every other kind of music that he grew up hearing.

Elvis synthesized all of these musical sources and brought to us what we grew to know as "Rock 'n' Roll music." In high school in Memphis, he sang a song in his classroom, and his teacher said "Elvis, you have a good voice, but you sing too fast, and no one can understand the words." (The boy was on his way.)

After Elvis had some success with his early songs on Sun Records, he was signed to RCA and recorded "Heartbreak Hotel" on January 10, 1956. It would be the first of his 51 gold and platinum records. He was drafted and served in the U.S. Army from March 24, 1958, to March 5, 1960, and was assigned to Fort Hood Army Base, Texas, for his basic training. During that time, his mother, Gladys, died of liver complications.

At his embarkation for Germany, an Army band played "All Shook Up," "Hound Dog," and "Don't Be Cruel," as the ship got under way. Elvis stood on the deck, handing out pictures and postcards to his fellow servicemen and threw kisses back to the pier to his screaming fans, who shrieked, according to the *New York Herald-Tribune*.

Elvis arrived in Bremerhaven, Germany, on October 1, 1958, as a member of the 750-man 32nd Tank Battalion, part of the fabled "Mailed Fist of Europe." He was known as a "good soldier," and on tank maneuvers, he demonstrated his ingenuity as a scout. More important, he became "one of the guys." He was never given special treatment, nor did he ever ask for any. However, he worried that his fans would forget him while he was away. He did not need to worry.

After his release from service, Elvis' first four recordings, "Stuck on You," "It's Now or Never," "Are You Lonesome Tonight," and "Surrender," each became number one hits and million sellers. His recordings are still collected today. Thousands of fans visit his former home "Graceland" each year, and many more traveled there for the 40th anniversary of his death.

There have been many imitators, but only one original. Elvis Presley served America honorably, and he did what his country asked of him. Let us be grateful for his service, and thankful for his musical memories.
