Legion Wins Bladensburg Memorial Supreme Court Case

The Bladensburg World War I Veterans Memorial isn't going anywhere.

In a landmark victory for The American Legion, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled 7-2 on June 20 that the 40-foot memorial can remain on public land in Prince George's County, Md., where it has stood since 1925.

"This was not just about a single cross," American Legion National Commander Brett Reistad said. "This was about the right of a community to honor its fallen heroes. And that's why the World War I veterans of Bladensburg sacrificed their lives, to protect the freedom of others."

In 1925, The American Legion and Gold Star Mothers erected the memorial as a tribute to 49 Prince George's County veterans who died during World War I. The cross shape was selected by the Gold Star Mothers to represent their sons' resting place in Europe.

For decades, the memorial stood peacefully until the American Humanist Association (AHA) filed suit, claiming the memorial violated the First Amendment. The Bladensburg memorial was funded privately and the property where it stands was in private hands when it was erected. However, now it sits on land owned by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission, a governmental agency.

"The American Legion does not consider these crosses which honor so many veterans to be religious memorials," Reistad explained. "But even if it were, freedom of religion is also a cherished right protected by our First Amendment. Americans can feel more confident today that veterans memorials, cemetery headstones and patriotic monuments throughout our country are safer as a result of this ruling."

The American Legion was represented at the Supreme Court by the legal teams at First Liberty Institute and Jones Day. Aligning with them was the state of Maryland, which owns and maintains the memorial.

Michael Carvin, lead counsel for The American Legion, partner at Jones Day and First Liberty network attorney, said, "We are grateful for this historic victory for the First Amendment. This decision simply affirms the historical understanding of the First Amendment that allows government to acknowledge the value and importance of religion."

Justice Samuel A. Alito Jr. wrote the majority opinion.

"The cross is undoubtedly a Christian symbol, but that fact should not blind us to everything else that the Bladensburg Cross has come to represent," he wrote. "For some, that monument is a symbolic resting place for ancestors who never returned home. For others, it is a place for the community to gather and honor all veterans and their sacrifices for our nation. For others

still, it is a historical landmark. For many of these people, destroying or defacing the cross that has stood undisturbed for nearly a century would not be neutral and would not further the ideals of respect and tolerance embodied in the First Amendment."

Chief Justice John G. Roberts Jr., Justices Clarence Thomas, Stephen G. Breyer, Elena Kagan, Neil M. Gorsuch and Brett M. Kavanaugh also were in the majority. Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Sonia Sotomayor dissented.

On Saturday, July 20, members of the 140th Colorado Air National Guard (COANG) Rising 6 came to Post 1 for their third annual car wash fundraiser. The volunteers are members of this unit and the Rising 6 is a leadership and community service organization comprised of six officers and other members who focus on providing help and support to junior enlisted airmen in development and leadership training. The Rising 6 is a private organization and is not part of the Department of Defense or any of its components, and has no governmental status. Through the Rising 6, the organization's support system was formed to help airmen in these areas of their career in the COANG and in their military family life.

The Rising 6 has a reciprocity agreement with the Jordanian Air Force and the 140th COANG wherein training is shared each year by the two units and knowledge and ideas come into focus on how to

LEGION Act Signed Into Law

In a significant legislative victory for The American Legion, President Trump signed a bill July 30 that declares the United States has been in a state of war since Dec. 7, 1941.

The American Legion sought the declaration as a way to honor approximately 1,600 U.S. service members who were killed or wounded during previously undeclared periods of war.

The LEGION Act (Let Everyone Get Involved In Opportunities for National Service Act) also opens the door for approximately 6 million veterans to access American Legion programs and benefits for which they previously had not been eligible.

"Recognizing the service of these wartime veterans is the right thing to do and it is long overdue," National Commander Brett Reistad said. "The families of those who were killed or wounded during these wartime acts should take pride in knowing that we recognize their sacrifice and service. Moreover, we are proud to welcome any of the six million living veterans from the previously unrecognized periods into our organization and call them 'Legionnaires.'"

Now that the legislation has been signed, The American Legion's eligibility criteria immediately changes from seven war eras to two: April 6, 1917, to Nov. 11, 1918, and Dec. 7, 1941 to a time later determined by the federal government. No other restrictions to American Legion membership are changed.

Reistad expressed gratitude to the bipartisan members of Congress for passing the legislation.

"We are grateful that President Trump fully acknowledges the importance of The American Legion by signing the LEGION Act in the White House today — just one week after it passed the House of Representatives," Reistad said. "In an era of partisan gridlock, Republicans and Democrats in Congress overwhelmingly recognized the importance of allowing thousands of honorable but previously ineligible veterans the right to join the largest and most influential veterans organization in the country."

National Commander Reistad pointed out that existing American Legion membership applications are in the process of being updated but can still be used. "In the meantime, I recommend that prospective Legionnaires and recruiters write 'LEGION Act' in the eligibility date section of American Legion membership applications if they fall outside the previous war eras," Reistad said. "The larger pool of veterans now eligible for The American Legion will also open their family members to eligibility in the Sons of the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary as well."

All Veterans Honor Guard Needs Volunteers

In 1993, DOD decided that the military would no longer provide Final Military Honors for Veterans. A couple of local men began recruiting Veterans to provide this service. Within a year the All Veterans Honor Guard (AVHG) was created.

The original organization was made up of six teams that were hosted by five American Legion and one VFW posts. Over the years the make-up of the organization has changed primarily because of the difficulty of recruiting volunteers. As of this writing we are down to five teams and the members come from multiple Veteran Service Organizations/Posts.

On occasion we receive unique requests. If possible, we honor those requests because everything we do is for that Vet and his or her family. In anticipation of another unique request we are creating an Honor Guard team of all female Veterans. This team will be used only if the family asks for an all-woman team, probably not more than once or twice a year.

Regardless of gender, please consider volunteering a few days a month to help the All Veterans Honor Guard continue to provide this service. Keep in mind that without volunteers there is no Honor Guard

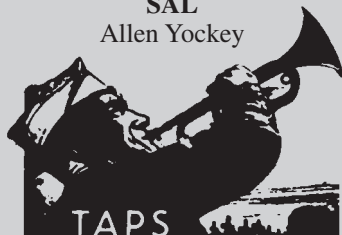
