LCW Post 1 Pearl Harbor Day

Saturday, December 7, 2019, and 87 years after the attack on Pearl Harbor, Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Post 1 held a memorial tribute to our veterans, civilians, and our nation, after being drawn into World War II as a result of the attack.

Glen Stenson served as the Master of Ceremonies and ensured the program moved along at a pace so as to allow guest speakers, ceremonial duties, and memorials the allotted time.

The LCW Post 1 Color Guard presented our nation's colors, conducted the Five Hats ceremony, and gave the reading of the purpose of the POW/MIA table.

It was a special treat to have Bianca Herbert from Bianca and the Flyboys sing our *National Anthem*, *Boogie-woogie Bugle Boy*, and lead us in singing *God Bless America*.

Brigadier General Sal Villano gave the tribute to the veterans at Pearl Harbor during the attack and spoke about the sacrifices of the

prior to the Veterans Day, a sword for cutting the birthday cake was presented to the oldest Marine (Will Webb) and the first piece of cake was served to the youngest Marine present.

Legionnaire

Jake Jacobson

Jake Jacobson (Ernest Jacobson Jr.) was drafted during World War II at the age of 18. A native of Gothenburg, Nebraska, a small farming community about 40 miles southeast of North Platte, Jake left the family farm for service to his country during the war. Like so many other veterans, the war was to have a profound effect on his life.

After receiving his Draft Board notice, instead of being drafted into the Army, Jake decided to enlist in the Navy, and was sent to Great Lakes Naval Training Center for his basic training. Upon completion of his basic training he was sent to the Naval Hospital Corpsman School in San Diego, California, and after this training, stationed at the Naval Hospital in Norman, Oklahoma.

Since the war was ending, Jake stayed at this duty station from January 1945 to August 1946. Jake recalls treating wounded Marines and how tough they were during their stay.

After his service was over, Jake moved to Denver and attended the University of Denver, using his G.I. Bill. He majored in accounting and worked for the U.S. Mint as the Chief Financial Manager. After 30 years of government service, Jake retired in 1986.

Jake was selected for the WW II Freedom Honor Flight in 2002 and he expressed how impressive it was to be on the trip and the level of care and hospitality that was shown to him. In addition to seeing the memorials, Jake recalled his time in the service and the emotions he went through during and after the war. With sadness in his voice, Jake spoke of the loss of many of his friends from this era and the close bond he formed with them during and after the war, and through the American Legion.

As a member of Post 1 for 17 years, Jake said he believed he is still honoring and serving his country through the American Legion. Jake quietly proclaims that he is a proud member and happy to be able to continue with service to our country.

For God And Country

The American Legion has used "For God and Country" since its inception in 1919. This came about because of the strong Christian beliefs of the American Legion's founding fathers. Our founders fully understood that our nation's Christian forefathers based the Constitution on the Bible.

In 1945, the Pledge of Allegiance was made the official pledge to our flag and country. Before being made the official flag pledge, it was known only as "The Pledge to our Flag." President Dwight D. Eisenhower added the words "under God," in 1954, to show the difference between the United States and the atheist Soviet Union.

The phrase "In God We Trust" was first stamped on a Union two-cent coin during the Civil War, and on all U.S. coins starting in 1938. The phrase owes its debut on our bills to the Cold War and was adopted as the country's official motto in 1956, when President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the proposal into law. It first appeared on paper money the following year. The words "In God We Trust" are found on numerous government buildings and in offices throughout Washington, D.C.

Presently, eight states have made the phrase "In God We Trust" mandatory and required the posting of the phrase in schools and classrooms. Our Christian heritage and our Constitution are under constant attack by those who deem the phrase to be offensive to non-Christians. Occasionally challenged on separation of church and state legality, these official invocations of God have been upheld by the United States Supreme Court.

We as veterans offered our services to defend our Constitution, to ensure it would remain a stalwart principle of our nation. Our credo at the American Legion will remain "In God We Trust" and we will adamantly oppose any attempts to change our credo.

On November 5, Commerce City Post 151 was the site of a dinner and introduction of our National Commander James W. (Bill) Oxford.

The opening ceremonies included a prayer by the Chaplain of Post 151, recognition of our POW/MIA sacrifices, and a pensive and dignified presentation of The Five Hats ceremony by the Color Guard from Post 1, and narrated by Dave Powers. During the opening of the dinner and meeting, some of the business matters of the Department and District 6 were discussed and goals for the upcoming year were outlined.

National Commander Oxford addressed his current and upcoming fundraising efforts. He encouraged members to purchase the American Legion's 100th Anniversary Commemorative Coins. The series was released on the Legion's centennial birthday, March 14. The sale and production of the coins will cease after December 31 and plans for purchasing the coins should be made now.

At the start of the new year, Commander Oxford will shift his fundraising emphasis from the centennial coins to The American Legion Veterans and Children's Foundation, which has a fundraising goal

of \$25 million.

For the 2019 membership year, 63,000 new members were recruited into The American Legion. Our National Commander's goal for 2020 is 100,000.

Commander Oxford ended his remarks with words he spoke during his acceptance speech following his election as national commander during the 101st National Convention in August. "We are all stakeholders in our American Legion. We are the future of this organization. We hold the future for this organization. And we and all of our brother and sister Legionnaires are its foundation. So let's count on each other as we build a Foundation for the Future to ensure that The American Legion can have a second century that our founders would be proud of."
