

Let's Work To Prevent Suicide

The VA recently launched the S.A.V.E. online suicide prevention training video in collaboration with PsychArmor Institute, a national nonprofit providing online education and support to those who work with, live with, or care for Service members, Veterans, and military and Veteran families. S.A.V.E. — which stands for "Signs," "Ask," "Validate," and "Encourage" and "Expedite" — offers simple steps that anyone can take when talking with Veterans who are at risk for suicide.

According to the VA, everyone has a role to play in preventing suicide. That's why the VA works with community partners across the coun-

try — including faith communities, employers, schools, and health care organizations — to prevent suicide among all Veterans, including those who may never come to VA for care.

We should all be keenly aware of the warning signs of suicide. Some include having extreme feelings of hopelessness, despair, and self-doubt; making end of life plans, preparing wills, giving away valued possessions; discussing suicide methods, purchasing weapons or acquiring large quantities of medication; drug or alcohol use which can cause impulsive behaviors; and isolation or the cutting off social connections with friends, family, and quitting a job.

The national Veteran Suicide Hotline number is 713-970-7000 and the number will soon be changed to a three-digit number. If a Veteran is unaware of the number, doesn't know where or how to get help, and most of all, has a feeling that no one cares, that all-important call by a veteran to the suicide prevention hotline may not be made.

Initiation Of New Members

John Holland

John J. Holland grew up in suburban Cleveland, Ohio, and is the Chaplain for Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Post 1. John enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps in 1966, a year after graduation from high school. Parris Island and Camp Lejeune were first on his list of duty stations, for basic training and advanced infantry training.

After completion of his basic and infantry training, he was assigned to train for MOS 6411, Air Traffic Controller, at Naval Air Station at Glynco, Georgia. Upon completion of air traffic controller training, John was sent to Marine Corps Air Facility, Santa Ana, California in July 1967. Santa Ana was a helicopter training facility and part of the Marine Air Base Squadron 56, Third Marine Aircraft Group 56, Fleet Marine Force Pacific.

Oddly enough, after a few months on the flight line, John was assigned to Special Services, and was responsible for recreation and morale. After earning the rank of Sergeant, John was sent to Camp Pendleton for POG (Personnel Other than a Grunt) training. He was a senior enlisted person but a junior sergeant being put through the paces of ground pounding Marines while awaiting orders to Vietnam.

The night before landing in Vietnam, at the helicopter base known as Marine Corps Air Facility Marble Mountain, Da Nang, Vietnam, the base incurred barrages of rockets from enemy forces. And as John relays his experience, it was uncanny that the same type of attack happened the night after he left his station, heading home since his tour of duty was over in May '70. During his time at Marble Mountain, he directed helicopters and fixed-wing aircraft from the control tower, performed Sergeant of the Guard duties, and the patrolling of the base perime-

ter when not in the flight tower.

After returning home, John witnessed the hatred and disrespect heaped upon the returning Vietnam veterans. The indignities made John stronger, giving him a resolve to support veterans, the American Legion, VFW, and the Vietnam Veterans of America. Other major events that occurred during his service were the civil rights disturbances of the '60s and the killing of Kent State students.

John attended Fuller Theological Seminary in Colorado Springs 2002-2004, after becoming the Chaplain for the State of Colorado VFW. He wanted to become a Chaplain and recognize the duty and honor of our veterans and to conduct military funerals for veterans, giving them the recognition and respect they deserved during and after their lives.

Marsha and John have been together for 27 years and from John's point of view, Marsha is the wind beneath his wings and his soulmate.

We are extremely grateful to Chaplain John Holland for the prayers he gives to God during our meetings, the final dignified services he conducts, and the dedication and devotion given by him to our veterans and Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Post 1.

SAL To Host Fundraiser For Reel Recovery Retreats

Reel Recovery was founded in 2003 by a group of avid fly-fishers, inspired by their fishing buddy's ongoing battle with brain cancer. Witnessing first-hand the beneficial impact fly-fishing provided their friend, the group created the Reel Recovery to provide the same opportunity for other men battling the disease.

Reel Recovery is a national non-profit organization that conducts free fly-fishing retreats for men recovering from all forms of cancer. Combining expert fly-fishing instruction with directed "courageous conversations," the organization offers a unique experience for men with cancer: a time to share their stories, learn a new skill, form lasting friendships and gain renewed hope as they confront the challenge of their recovery.

Though only a few days in duration, a Reel Recovery retreat can be a life-changing event for men coping with cancer. The program is designed to be both experiential and reflective, to develop group camaraderie as well as individual skills, and to build bonds of friendship that provide a reservoir of personal hope.

Retreats are conducted over a two-and-a-half day period at a fly-fishing facility/lodge with onsite or nearby fishing access. All meals, lodging and fly-fishing equipment

are provided. Men from the local area attend and no prior fishing experience is necessary. All fish caught are released and local fish and game laws are obeyed. In addition, medical personnel are present for the medical support of the participants.

The SAL will host a pork schnitzel dinner on April 4, at 5:30 p.m., to raise funds to support veterans that want to attend the Reel Recovery Retreats. Dinner will include schnitzels, hot German potato salad, Bavarian red cabbage, spiced carrots, and dessert, all for the price of \$10. Tickets will be available at the bar after March 1. There is one veteran the SAL wants to sponsor for the Reel Recovery retreat this spring and your support will be extremely appreciated. Please come out for the fun and great food.



Voiture 97 proudly celebrates 100 years of service to veterans and their families.

In March 1920, Joseph W. Breen, a member of the newly formed American Legion and an officer of Breen McCracken American Legion Post 297, met in Philadelphia with 15 other prominent Legionnaires where they originated the idea of The Forty and Eight. The organization was named La Société des Quarante Hommes et Huit Chevaux (The Society of Forty Men and Eight Horses). Its members were called Voyageurs Militaire (military travelers) and candidates for membership were called Prisonniers de Guerre (Prisoners of War). The cargo capacity sign "40 Hommes/8 Chevaux" emblazoned on each French boxcar that carried American doughboys to the front, and

"French horizon blue" color, became symbols of the new society. The French railroad theme was applied to officer titles and organizational functions. An initiation ceremony was developed based on the common wartime experiences of American soldiers, sailors and marines, incorporating fun making with patriotic bonding. www.fortyandeight.org, For God and Country.

United Veterans Coalition Of Colorado — A Unified Voice For Veterans

Perhaps you have heard the abbreviation "UVC or UVCC" and know the Coalition works to help veterans and active duty military service members. According to their bylaws, their purpose is to be a proactive, statewide organization promoting legislative, humanitarian and educational activities for the best interest and welfare of veterans. The Coalition actively supports programs including, but not limited to, health care, community living centers, employment and training, education and rehabilitation, veteran homelessness, entitlements and benefits. Through the UVC, and with one unified voice in Colorado, the UVC works with public policy makers to ensure proper support for veteran issues and concerns and to inform/educate Colorado citizens about the needs and the high value contributions of veterans, active duty service members, National Guard, the Reserves, and their families.

Currently, the Coalition has about 32 veteran member organizations

that participate in the "unified voice" alliance and thereby the members benefit from the work accomplished through legislative efforts, in the State of Colorado and Federal legislative forums.

During the 2020 Colorado Legislative sessions, the Coalition will work with legislative forums and representatives on legislation such as:

HB20-1051 — Identification of Veteran Remains for Proper Military Burial. Concerning final disposition of the abandoned cremated remains of persons eligible for interment in a national cemetery.

HB20-1190 — Disabled Veteran Registration Fees and Ownership Tax. Concerning clarifying whether a veteran with a disability needs to obtain a disabled veteran license plate to qualify for the current exemption from paying vehicle assessments.

HB20-1222 — Veterans Hiring Preference. Concerning the authority of a private employer to adopt a

veteran's preference employment policy when hiring new employees.

SB20-091 — Minimum Pay for State Military Forces. Concerning increasing the minimum pay for state military forces called into service by the governor.

SB20-148 — Property Tax Exemption Value Adjustments. Concerning the amount of actual value of residential real property owned and occupied by a qualifying senior or a qualifying disabled veteran that is partly exempt from property taxation.

The foregoing is an extremely abbreviated list of bills the UVC hopes to help pass and without the unified voice approach of the Coalition, the legislation may not be passed. The American Legion is part of the Coalition and we will continue our support and maintain a sense of gratitude for all they do for all veterans.

The numerous list of the bills before the legislative committees will be posted on our bulletin board.

President's Report

Unit membership total — On February 11, 2020, our membership total was at 217. Our membership goal is 265. We only need 65 new or renewing members to attain this goal. Keep up the good work.

New membership eligibility dates for both The American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary — The new eligibility dates for membership in The American Legion include April 6, 1917 to November 11, 1918, and any time after December 7, 1919. The expansion of these eligibility dates should help us in recruiting new auxiliary members. In addition, the American Legion Auxiliary has changed the eligibility criteria to include spouses and clarified that stepdaughters would not be eligible to join as new members. Also, that there can only be two steps of relationship between the Legion member and a possible new member; if a stepdaughter or great-granddaughter is already a member, she may remain a member as long as dues are current.

New application for membership form — A new application for membership to the American Legion Auxiliary was developed. Unit One membership Chairman Georgia Sweeney has some copies available in the office or you may download a copy from the department web site (alacolorado.com) under the membership committee section. There you will find the new form as a PDF file. This can be printed. Also, there is a membership application for both The American Legion and the Sons of The American Legion.

Nominating Committee election — A nominating committee will be elected at the March unit meeting. This committee consists of at least one past unit president and two-unit members. It will be their duty to seek a slate of officers for the year 2020-2021. As the current president, I encourage members to consider seeking nomination and election to one of the unit offices.

Term limits — According to the Unit One Bylaw [Article I-Section 2](#). Officers shall be elected at the regular May meeting and installed as soon as possible thereafter. These officers shall assume their duties on July 1. The President may hold office for two consecutive years. All

others may be re-elected for any number of years." I will be completing my second year as the unit president and therefore I am "termed" out. Term limits are a good thing for any organization. This allows and encourages the membership to put new leaders in office with new ideas on how to make our organization even better than it is now.

The Mardi Gras celebration — The funds raised will be sent to the Auxiliary Emergency Fund. This fund helps auxiliary members who find themselves in financial difficulties due to illness, accidents, or acts of nature such as tornados, fires, floods, or earthquakes. The member may obtain a request for the funds through their local auxiliary unit, which is forwarded onto the national headquarters through the department office. The contents of these transactions are held in strict confidence. There will be a more detailed report about the Mardi Gras celebration in the next edition.
