As Post 1 members leap into 2021, I want to stop and thank all of the Legion families for the support and hard work they do in support of Post 1. Thank you Sons of the American Legion. Thank you Auxiliary. Thank you American Legion Riders. In addition, thank you 40/8 for being an integral part of Post 1.

Also I want to say thank you to team Yagley, Tom and Nick, for preparing the Thanksgiving Turkey. A big thanks goes to Randy Ackerman, I am sure Spencer and Al Taylor joined in. And finally, thank you Chris Mulqueen. I do not have enough space to cover what Chris does for Post 1.

Next, it is with sadness to remember a great American, General Charles (Chuck) Elwood Yeager. A veteran of WWII, Korea, and Vietnam, General Yeager earned the ACE status when shooting down five enemy aircraft in one mission. In addition he was credited with shooting down a total of 12.5 enemy aircraft. The other .5 was credited to a second pilot with an assist. On October 14, 1947, at an altitude of 45,000 feet he became the first pilot to break the sound barrier. Again General Chuck Yeager's accomplishments could and have filled books and movies. I believe we all know the words of another fighter pilot John Gillespie Magee Jr., when he begins "Oh, I have slipped the surly bonds of earth, And danced the skies on laughter-silvered wings; Godspeed General Yeager."

Post 1 had a good start recovering after the first closure. We seemed to be geared up for a great finish in 2020, then the government imposed some severe restrictions and we were forced to close the middle of November. Many plans were scrapped and some will be conducted in 2021. Keep checking in for details. Hopefully the many vaccines will help put Post 1 back in the business of helping veterans.

Since the Post has been closed and news events are not as plentiful I thought I would share a story of a Denver native and veteran. The young man, Sgt. Walter Springs, was a student at Regis College and had a personality which endeared him to everybody he came in contact with, students, teachers, and coaches alike. Walter was the only black student and voted most popular out of a couple hundred students his junior year. Walter at 5' 7" and 160 pounds was a top boxer on the boxing team, a starting full-back on the football team, a well-rounded student.

A few months later Walter left Regis to serve his country in a segregated army during WWII. Just after midnight on December 17, 1942, Sgt. Walter Springs was shot and killed by a white M.P. in a Bastrop, Texas, café only a few miles from where he was to report for Officer Candidate School.

There is little argument to what exactly happened that night which left Walter Springs to bleed to death on the diner floor. Walter Springs did not die on a foreign battle field, he never left the United States.

What happened to Walter Springs, a confrontation, an accident, misunderstanding or simple racism? I will hang the article on the bulletin board. *Parts reprinted with permission from author Karen Augé Editor, Regis Magazine.* God bless America, our troops, and Post 1.

Most of the American Legion family wonder, who are these leather clad men and women that frequent the Mid-Year and June American Legion convention? We are The American Legion Riders. Our purpose, besides the love of the wind in our face and hair and the sound of the pipes on our Harleys, Indians, Victories and all the other V-twin motorcycles, is to serve the needs of veterans and their children. Especially the children! Every year, the various ALR's around the state and nation find a veteran's family in need, to help. This year, with a big thank you to the VFW Post 1 Auxiliary for the assist, we selected the McMahons. They are Gary, Amber, Hadley or Haddie and Rhyss, age 3.

This family has seen their fair share of problems. Their 16-month-old daughter Haddie, has a Glioblastoma on her brain stem at the base of her skull. It was discovered when she was 3-months-old. This is one of the worst types of cancer for a person of any age, let alone a small child. There is no cure and it is always fatal. The average life span of an adult after surgery is 18 months. My father-in-law died of this cancer, so I unfortunately have more knowledge of this type of cancer than I ever wanted.

Gary is a member of the Colorado National Guard with over 20 years of service and holds the rank of Sgt. 1st class or E-7. He serves with the 193rd Military police Battalion, out of Denver. In addition to care for Haddie, Gary was called up during the late spring and summer to serve with law enforcement in Denver during the protests and

demonstrations.

Outside of his military duties, Gary works as a Training Specialist for B.I. a Boulder company that handles immigration issues for the government. Amber, Gary's wife, also works for B.I. as a Regional Director. They have been married for 5-1/2 years, live in Frederick, Colo., and met playing rugby.

Because of the nature of this cancer and the many surgeries, chemotherapy, radiation, and other treatments, they have faced difficult times. Haddie is now at home but needs care 24/7. They had a nurse to help with some of these issues, but with the development of COVID-19, nurses for this type of care are scarce. This has required one of them to provide this type of care themselves for this delightful little girl.

Although they both can work from home, the amount of care required for Haddie has resulted in Gary having to take significant time away from work. Fortunately, B.I. provides unpaid leave for Gary so he is able to handle the issues surrounding Haddie's healthcare while Amber can continue to work.

We, the Riders of American Legion LCW Post 1, found this family to be very worthy of our help. I have had several conversations with the family and they expressed their gratitude and thanks to the American Legion Riders and The American Legion LCW Post 1.

We visited the family on December 21, to give them a Christmas, biker style. Along with presents, we gave them a check to assist in their immediate needs. May God continue to watch over this family and may God bless the LCW Post 1 ALR, The American Legion, all of you readers and the United States of America.

Thanks to the hard-working Post One family members we have been able to improvise, adapt, and overcome some of the restrictions that the nasty COVID-19 virus has thrown at us.

Socktober — A big thank you to our Community Service Committee Chairman Edrie O'Brien and the very generous Post One family members for a successful Socktober. A total of 748 pairs of socks were collected. Even at \$1 per pair, that is an equivalent of \$748 in contributions. The socks were distributed to the VA Hospital, Jefferson County Court Veterans Program, Adams County Court Veterans Program, Odyssey Family Housing, Denver Fischer House, and Valor Point. In addition, socks will be sent to Ovie Vernon, Unit Two to be distributed to veterans in the Pueblo area.

Annual Holiday Fair — Under normal circumstances, we would have held a holiday fair the Saturday after Thanksgiving which coincides with Small Business Saturday. This is when the various crafters in the area would have a table to sell their wares. In addition, we would have had a bake sale, lunch, and drawings

for gifts. Unfortunately, this event was canceled for this year. But thanks to a **very clever unit member, Margaret Stenson**, we were able to hold an alternative fund raiser. She composed this poem:

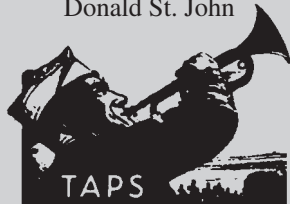

Herbicide Exposure And Agent Orange

The Blue Water Navy (BWN) Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 (PL 116-23) extended the presumption of herbicide exposure, such as Agent Orange, to Veterans who served in the offshore waters of the Republic of Vietnam between Jan. 9, 1962 and May 7, 1975.

Beginning Jan. 1, 2020, Veterans who served as far as 12 nautical miles from the shore of Vietnam, or who had service in the Korean Demilitarized Zone, are presumed to have been exposed to herbicides, such as Agent Orange, and may be entitled to service connection for any of the 14 conditions related to herbicide exposure. (See website listed below.)

VA is also now able to extend benefits to children with spina bifida whose BWN Veteran parent may have been exposed while serving.

Additionally, PL 116-23 made changes to the VA Home Loan Program, specifically, but not all-inclusive:

1 — VA-guaranteed home loans will no longer be limited to the Federal Housing Finance Agency (Federally-established) Confirming Loan Limits.

2 — Veterans will now be able to obtain a no-down payment home

loan in all areas, regardless of loan amount.

3 — The law exempts Purple Heart recipients currently serving on active duty from the VA Home Loan funding fee.

4 — VA removed the loan limit for Native American Veterans seeking to build or purchase a home on Federal Trust Land.


5 — At this time, there is a temporary change to the VA Funding Fee, which is a congressionally mandated fee associated with the VA Home Loan. Veterans and service members will see a slight increase of 0.15 to 0.30% in their funding fee (currently for two years), while National Guard and Reserve members will see a slight decrease in their fee to align with the fee paid by "Regular Military" borrowers (permanent). Veterans with service-connected disabilities, some surviving spouses, and other potential borrowers are exempt from the VA loan-funding fee and will not be impacted by this change.
