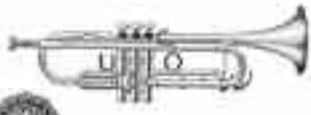

## 40/8 Voiture 97

We all know Glen Stenson, WWII Veteran, The American Legion Past Commander, Forty & Eight State and Nationale Officer, always active in the Community. During the war Glen served in the Pacific as hospital corpsman. Glen and Mart were invited to a very special occasion, observing the 80th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor by Japan, December 7, 1941. They flew to Dallas, Texas, where more than 60 WWII Veterans and escorts attended a Banquet in their honor. From there they flew to Honolulu and Pearl Harbor. American Airlines and the Best Defense

Foundation arranged the trip to honor the service and sacrifice of these 63 World War II veterans.

Glen shared with us — this was one of his most memorable events. The week-long journey included the tours visiting numerous national sites and attending patriotic ceremonies honoring these WWII Veterans. The rain finally ceased. One special moment, presenting a Wreath with Gary Sinise at the National Cemetery, Punchbowl Crater in Honolulu.

# Ten Myths About Your Constitution And Bylaws

Answers Prepared

Please read the following myths about your constitution and bylaws and answer either true or false after you have read the "myth." This exercise can be done alone or as a group exercise during a unit meeting.

1. Only the president and secretary can have a copy of your constitution and bylaws.

**False — each member in the organization is entitled to have a copy of the constitution (C), bylaws (B), and other governing documents. These documents should be given when the member first joins the organization.**

2. Your parliamentary authority must be identified in your bylaws.

**True, having this fact in the bylaws allows the members knowledge on how the organization will be run. If the authority is not mentioned in the bylaws, the organization could vote to follow a different authority at each meeting. This could lead to confusion and chaos.**

3. The parliamentary authority supersedes your constitution and bylaws.

**False. The parliamentary authority is consulted after looking for the answer in the C & B.**

4. Your parent organization should have a current copy of your constitution and bylaws.

**True. In the event the unit or districts copy of the C & B disappears, there is at least one copy for**

the unit or district to fall back on.

5. Your constitution and bylaws do not need to be in compliance with your parent organization.

**False. The unit or district C & B must be in compliance with the parent organization. Being out of compliance with the parent organization can lead to disciplinary actions by the parent organization. To assist in the continued compliance the governing documents should state.**

**"This (constitution or bylaws) will be automatically updated to be in compliance with the national governing documents." If you have this in your documents, changes can be easily made. You then would notify your members of any changes and why.**

According to the national Standing Rule Article XIII – Authority, "Any provision of any Department or Unit Constitution or Bylaws, any subsidiary intermediate body, or affiliated entity's bylaws, or any regulation of any Department, Unit, subsidiary, intermediate body, or affiliated entity in conflict either with the foregoing authority shall be void." Page 21 of the national governing documents.

6. Once written and adopted, you should never have to refer to your copy of the constitution and bylaws.

**False. These documents should be reviewed at periodic intervals to ensure that the contents describe your current practices. If there is any question about what to do, the first thing that should happen is to say, "What does it say in the bylaws?"**

7. Your bylaws should contain a dissolution article.

**True. As a non-profit organization the members cannot profit if the unit or district no longer exists. The dissolution clause must contain information that describes the disposition of money, other**

assets, and any paper documents (charter, minutes, etc.). This is mentioned in the national standing rule # VIII Subsidiary organizations page 46.

8. Standing rules are easier to add, amend, or strike out than your constitution.

**True. According to Robert's Rules of Order, page 18.**

Standing rules, as understood in this book, except in the case of conventions, are rules (1) which are related to the details of the administration of a society rather than to the parliamentary procedure, and (2) which can be adopted or changed upon the same conditions as any act of society." Examples would be the time the meeting is to convene.

Standing rules are generally adopted as the need occurs.

A standing rule is adopted by a majority without previous notice provided the new rule does not conflict with any existing rule or act of the society.

A Standing rule remains in effect until it is rescinded or suspended. Only suspended for that meeting the suspension is voted on.

Rules that have application outside a meeting cannot be suspended.

9. The only official copy of your unit bylaws is the copy at department or national headquarters.

**False. The official copy of your unit bylaws is the most current copy. Each time your bylaws are updated or amended, these changes must be sent to department keeping to be filed with your other documents.**

10. The only official business meeting is a face-to-face meeting.

**False. Meetings may be conducted face to face, Skype, go to meetings, or by teleconference. The different types of meetings must be authorized in your documents as well as the procedures for making motions, debating, and voting.**
