

Marine Corps 247th Birthday On November 10

On Veterans Day the Marine Corps celebrated its 247th Birthday. The Marine Corps birthday cake-cutting ceremony is important to all Marines, as it is an annual renewal of each Marine commitment to the Corps and the Corps' commitment to our nation's quest for peace and freedom worldwide.

The birthday cake is traditionally cut with the Mameluke sword, as a reminder that we are a band of warriors, committed to carrying the sword, so that our nation may live in peace. The Mameluke sword gets its name from the cross hilt and ivory grip design, similar to swords used for centuries by Ottoman warriors. The Marine Corps tradition of carrying this sword dates from Lieutenant Presley O'Bannon's assault of Derna, Trip-



oli, in 1805, where he is said to have won the sword of the governor of the city.

As is our custom, the first piece of cake will be presented to our

guest of honor. The second piece is presented to the oldest Marine in attendance, signifying the honor and respect accorded to experience and seniority. Symbolically, the eldest Marine present passes a piece of cake to the youngest Marine present, just as for years our experienced Marines have nurtured and led young Marines that will fill our ranks and renew our Corps.

REMEMBERING MARY DENISE HADDON President Rocky Mountain Honor Flight

It was with great sadness that we learned of the passing of a wonderful person and friend to Veterans. Mary Haddon passed away November 8, 2022. The following is from her obituary:

Mary's proudest professional achievement came from her involvement with Rocky Mountain Honor Flight, a non-profit organization dedicated to honoring World War II veterans for their sacrifice and service. She joined as a volunteer in 2007 before being appointed President in 2008. For over 14 years she passionately campaigned to raise funds and awareness, devoting time and resources to organize 41 trips flying veterans to Washington, D.C., to see memorials in their honor, serving more than 1,200 former service members. Her organizational skills in planning trips led to Rocky Mountain Honor Flight becoming a gold standard in the Honor Flight network, with her itinerary used to train other regional networks in how to create memorable experiences. For all her efforts, Mary received numerous national and local service awards and recognitions all of

which she tried to downplay in order to refocus the spotlight on "Her Veterans."

I can add that she had a droll sense of humor, and that she was one of the

most outstanding people I have ever met.



La Société des Quarante Hommes et Huit Chevaux (The Society of Forty Men and Eight Horses) is an independent, by invitation, honor society of American veterans, more commonly known as "The Forty & Eight."

The Forty & Eight is committed to charitable and patriotic aims. Our purpose is to uphold and defend the United States Constitution of the United States, to promote the well-

being of veterans, their widows, widowers, and orphans, and to actively participate in selected charitable endeavors, which include among others, programs that promote child welfare and nurses training.

Membership is by invitation, and open only to honorably discharged veterans and honorably serving members of the United States Armed Forces.

POW/MIA Survivors Scholarship

Voiture 97 of the 40 & 8 is starting a POW/MIA Survivors Scholarship. The purpose of the POW/MIA Program is to raise funds in Honor of the Servicemen & Women who were Prisoners of War or are considered Missing in Action while serving in the defense of the United States of America, or its allies during times of armed conflict. The funds are raised to facilitate the formation and continuance of a Scholarship Trust Fund for the direct descendants of verifiable POW/MIA Servicemen and Women. Scholarships are limited to the Veteran, the Spouse of the veteran, children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren of the veteran.

A brief description of the POW/MIA program of La Societe and how it differs from the program of the American Legion. There seems to be a lot of misconception that it is a parallel program working toward the same objectives. The two programs are not in conflict with each other. They co-exist quite well and in fact enhance each other. The program of the 40 & 8 is a "POW/MIA Survivors Scholarship Fund." This Scholarship is named in memory of Lance Corporal John Dewey Killen III USMC. Lance Corporal Killen was declared Missing in Action while serving with The Third Reconnaissance Battalion in South Vietnam.

ELIGIBILITY

Those eligible to apply for scholarship funds shall be limited to the Veteran, Spouse, Sons, Daughters, Grandsons, Granddaughters, Great-Grandsons, and Great-Granddaughters. Further consideration for scholarship funding by the Committee will be based upon, but not limited to, the following eligibility requirements:

- Verifiable documentation of relationship to the veteran through which the application is being made.
- Certified transcripts of the previous academic achievements.
- Financial need.
- Written acceptance of enrollment by an accredited college or university.
- The continuance of scholarship funding shall be determined by a Committee review of the recipients' semester grades which under no condition can be less than a "C" average.
- All scholarship funds will allow Directeur to decide on a case-by-case basis if Scholarship funds shall be paid directly to the applicant or the university.

A perpetual trust has been established to fund said scholarships, utilizing only the interest earned from the trust and any cash reserves not required for operational expenses and/or the reimbursement of National General Funds.

FUNDRAISING

Our primary source of fundraising has been thru the sale of Pins and Decals each year.

THE FUTURE

This is where everyone can help with the program. This is a Survivors Scholarship, it is not just for members of La Societe. Remember our MIAs have not had the opportunity to decide which Veterans organization they might want to join. Many Ex-POWs have joined other groups or not joined any organization. If we make individuals, the Legion, VFW, Churches, and Fraternal Organizations aware of the POW/MIA Scholarship that is available, those who believe in the program will help it prosper and grow.

Parliamentary Minute Or Two

The last issue contained information on how to make and state a main motion. Now, we will talk about how to perfect a main motion.

This is the **example motion** we will use: "I move to purchase new office chairs." This motion will not be discussed at any of the regular meetings. We will use the motion to "Amend."

We can amend by adding information at the end of motion, "I move to amend by adding 'not to exceed \$300' after the word chairs."

The presiding officer repeats the amendment and says, "if adopted the main motion will read — to purchase new office chairs not to exceed \$300."

We can amend by inserting words into the motion. "I move to insert 'red, white, and blue' before the word office." The presiding officer repeats the amendment and says, "if adopted the main motion will read: To purchase new red, white, and blue office chairs not to exceed \$300."

Both amendments were adopted. A step that some organizations overlook is they then have the need to vote to adopt or reject motion in its perfected form. "Those in favor of the motion to purchase new red, white, and blue office chairs not to exceed \$300. say Aye — those opposed say No." Always take the negative vote. "The Ayes have it and we will purchase new red, white, and blue office chairs not to exceed \$300."

Among the variety of gifts, from priceless treasures of art to small tokens from poor but grateful villages, is an antique automobile. The note attached to the vehicle states it is one of the first petroleum-operated automobiles "built in 1893, which could travel at the record speed of 20 miles per hour." It was donated by an electrician from Royan, France. Other items included artwork, rare books, products from French industry, decorative pieces, a saber that belonged to Napoleon Bonaparte, a Sevres blue vase from France's President Vincent Aurion (one vase went to each state), and a stuffed toy dog belonging to a little girl who wanted it to go to an American girl her age. Also, the train of gratitude was loaded with dolls and dishes, historical documents, a Rodin statue, busts of Benjamin Franklin and Franklin Roosevelt, silk dresses, and battle-torn flags. It even included the flag that flew from the Eiffel Tower when Gen. George Patton entered in 1944. The Indiana boxcar contained the bugle that ended World War I, sent by a French sergeant as his most valuable possession. That artifact is on display at the Indiana War Memorial.
